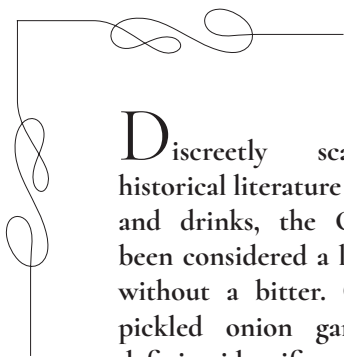

Tasmania, AUS

It was the late 1980s when Bill Lark posed the question that would pioneer the future of whisky in Tasmania. “*I wonder why there isn't anyone making malt whisky in Tasmania?*” Soon after, Bill, in partnership with his equally curious wife Lyn, received the first Tasmanian distiller's license, that which had not been granted in over 150 years. Armed with little more than a makeshift still on their kitchen table and an abundance of courage, the Larks set out on a quest for excellence. Over the course of three decades, Lark Distillery has become synonymous with the finest craftsmanship and the true spirit of Tasmania. With each batch distilled, they have woven a narrative of passion, innovation, and a deep connection to the land

WOODFORD RESERVE

Kentucky, USA

Current Master Distiller Chris Morris is only the second person to hold the title at Woodford Reserve. While the history of the brand is a relative recent one, the art of making fine bourbon first took place on the distillery site in 1812. Together with Assistant Master Distiller Elizabeth McCall, Chris has been able to craft one of the world's most agreeably appreciated bourbons.

Bouze-Les-Beaune, France

Today his vision for truly remarkable whisky is continued by his son-in-law, Cyril Deschamps, and cellar master Jean-Arnaud Frantzen. Their whiskies are focused on the masterful artistry of maturation, the slow process of ageing in oak.

By selecting high-quality old casks, those used in port or sherry production, Rachel infuses her distillate with rich, complex flavours that set it apart from the rest. Glendronach's commitment to tradition and innovation, combined with its reverence for the influence of cask maturation, has solidified its reputation as a producer of some of the finest whiskies in the world.

TALISKER

Isle of Skye, Scotland

Talisker's tagline, 'made by the sea,' encapsulates both geography and philosophy of this iconic whisky. Situated on the coastline of Skye, the distillery draws inspiration from its maritime surroundings, which profoundly influences the flavour profile of its whiskies. Talisker is renowned for its complex interplay of flavours including the unmistakable briny flavour, reminiscent of the sea air that sweeps across Skye's shores. There is a noticeable white pepper underbelly and smoky veil that imparts a distinctively robust miscellany of aromats. Curiously, all expressions of Talisker share the same unusual alcohol by volume of 45.8%, a deliberate choice by the distillery contributing to the whisky's bold and assertive character.

BLADNOCH

Lowlands, Scotland

The Bladnoch distillery's tumultuous history indeed mirrors the ebb and flow of fortunes that have affected many Scottish whisky distilleries.. Established in 1817, it has weathered numerous changes in ownership facing challenges that threatened its very existence. Between 1926 and 1956, the distillery remained largely silent, with only a single distillation in 1930. However, in 2015, the distillery found a new lease on life when it was acquired by Australian David Prior. Recognising the potential of Bladnoch and its storied legacy, Prior embarked on a significant refurbishment project. The hiring of Master Distiller Ian MacMillan, a highly acclaimed figure in the whisky industry, underscored Prior's commitment. With these investments, Bladnoch began once again in 2017, marking a triumphant return. This rejuvenation not only breathed new life into the distillery but also reaffirmed its place amongst Scotland's most cherished whisky producers.

ARDBEG

Islay, Scotland

Founded in 1815, alongside its Islay neighbour Laphroaig, Ardbeg's history is intertwined with the rich tradition of whisky-making on the island. Today Ardbeg leads the way with special releases and limited bottlings. From its humble beginnings to its current status as a shining star in the whisky firmament, Ardbeg remains one of our favoured Island whiskies.

LAGAVULIN

Islay, Scotland

Lagavulin's rich, peaty aroma, heavy with smoke, seaweed, and iodine, transports drinkers to the rugged shores of Islay with every sip. The peat smoke, derived from the island's abundant peat bogs, infuses the whisky with a robust and complex flavour. The reputation of Lagavulin is such that it's said a Scotsman can detect the opening of a bottle from across the bar, an affirmation of Lagavulin's potency and unmistakable presence. This whisky isn't merely a beverage; it's an experience - an embodiment of the rich heritage of Islay.

COGNAC

Spanning six distinct growth areas or 'crus', including Grande Champagne, Petite Champagne, Borderies, Fins Bois, Bons Bois, and Bois Ordinaires, the Cognac region boasts diverse landscapes that contribute to the complexity of the spirit. The grapes used in Cognac production - Ugni Blanc (also known as Trebbiano), Folle Blanche, Colombar - yield a tart, relatively neutral wine that serves as an appropriate base for distillation into eau-de-vie.

"All Cognac is brandy but not all brandy is Cognac"

The age of Cognac serves as a marker of its quality and maturity. Designations such as VSOP (Very Superior Old Pale) and XO (Extra Old) indicate varying ageing periods, with some exceptional Cognac aged for several decades. These aged expressions represent the pinnacle of Cognac craftsmanship offering unparalleled richness and complexity.

PAUL GIRAUD

Cognac, France

Cognac Paul Giraud is a family-owned estate located in Bouteville, a small village in the heart of Grande Champagne - the Premier Cru of Cognac. The property has remained within the family since 1635 with ownership proudly passed down through ten generations. Under the leadership of Paul Jean Giraud, the 10th generation stewarding the domain, the establishment of brand 'Cognac Paul Giraud' in 1975 marked the beginning of a new chapter for the family-owned estate. With a commitment to quality and tradition, the label is now considered a beacon of quality as one of the leading artisanal producers of the region.

ARMAGNAC

Armagnac is one of the oldest of grape brandies with production dating back to the 15th Century, its appellation found in Gascony in France's Southwest. Whilst Armagnac and Cognac share a common heritage and similar regulatory framework, they offer vastly unique expressions of French craftsmanship. Exploring the differences between these two venerable spirits can be a rewarding journey. Ugni Blanc dominates Cognac production and is double distilled to produce a higher alcohol content and broader palate. Armagnac, on the other hand, is single distilled and may include grapes such as Baco Blanc, Folle Blanche, and Colombard lending it a broader spectrum of flavours, aromas, and distinctive rusticity.

DARROZE

Roquefort, France

Francis and Marc Darroze's journey through the tawny sands of the Grand Bas Armagnac is a testament to their dedication and original vision. In the 1960's they scoured the region to identify the most exceptional estates, each to lend its own unique character to the Darroze collection. Today, around thirty domains are contributing to Darroze's extraordinary portfolio of distillations, whereby the eaux-de-vie from these estates undergo a process of refinement and maturation in Darroze's cellars, located in both Roquefort and Labastide d'Armagnac. Under the watchful eye of the Darroze family, the spirits are nurtured and aged to perfection.

CALVADOS

Calvados, often referred to as apple brandy albeit produced from pear and apple rather than grapes, hails from Normandy in France's north. Traditional production involves fermenting the juice into cider, followed by distillation into spirit. The resulting eau-de-vie is then aged in oak barrels, where it undergoes a transformative maturation process, acquiring depth, complexity, and a rich array of flavours that encapsulate the spirit of the Normand orchards from whence it came. The two delimited zones of quality production are the esteemed Pays d'Auge - considered the most prestigious area - and Domfrontais, allowing a higher proportion of pear in the blend.

ROGER GROULT

Pays d'Auge, France

Roger Groult Calvados epitomises the values of family, authenticity, and love that have been passed down through generations, shaping the character of this esteemed brand. Now run by fifth-generation Jean-Roger Groult, the family's story as distillers began in 1860 when Pierre Groult began converting his family's cider into his own apple brandy - a tradition that has been upheld by the Groult family ever since. Today, they stand as pre-eminent benchmark for the category with every step of the process, from the Normand orchards to the bottle in hand, guided by a profound reverence for the historic land and its bounty.

VICTOR GONTIER

Domfrontais, France

In a world where mass production often overshadows artisanal craftsmanship, Victor Gontier Calvados stands as a shining example of tradition. Rooted in three generations of small-farm production, and distilling a minimum one third pear into the blend, production is extremely limited and released as single distillations from a single year. Victor Gontier delivers rustic, farmhouse charm through tenacious bravery; the ultimate in dedication to preserving heritage.

NONINO

Friuli-Venezia Giulia, Italy

The art of distillation has been a Nonino Family privilege since 1897. Quality, innovation, research, professionalism and love for their work are their distinctive mark. Orazio Nonino, the founder of the family, is ultimately followed by 6 generations, now helmed by Elisabetta and Francesca Nonino. 1984 proved to be a year of significance for the Nonino family, delivering a breakthrough in the world of distillation with the creation of their Grape Distillate Ûe. Departing from traditional methods, they pioneered the distillation of the whole grape, unlocking a new realm of flavour and complexity.

AMARO

Italy

Amaro, derived from the Italian word for bitter, is a vast category of herbal liqueurs offering a complex symphony of flavours ranging from bitter and herbal to sweet and aromatic. Typically deep tawny in colour, and originally conceived as health tonics, amari (the plural form) were valued for their purported medicinal benefits. Italy boasts a rich tradition of amaro production, with many small towns or families having their own closely guarded recipes passed down through generations, resulting in a diverse array of regional specialties quite often specific to local ingredients.

CHARTREUSE

Voiron, France

The history of Chartreuse is indeed steeped in mystique and intrigue, reminiscent of a tale from a fantastical realm. It all began in 1605 when François-Annibal d'Estrées, a French military officer, shared a recipe with a group of monks, promising an elixir of long life. Little did they know this recipe would become the foundation of one of the world's most enigmatic liqueurs. With a staggering 130 ingredients, it took another 150 years for the monks to perfect the recipe and it wasn't until 1840 Chartreuse Verte (green) and Chartreuse Jaune (yellow) were first released. To this day, only two Carthusian monks are entrusted with the recipe and maintain a vow of silence. The veil of secrecy that surrounds Chartreuse forever ensures this 'magical elixir' remains shrouded in mystery and mystique.

As one of the most esteemed tequila producers, the casa has left an indelible mark on the industry, pioneering innovations that have redefined the standards of quality and craftsmanship. They are credited with inventing the classifications of Reposado and Extra Añejo, a testament to their innovative spirit. Their commitment extends to the production of their own American White Oak barrels by cooping their barrels in-house, allowing meticulous control over their ageing process and final profile of their product. Herradura tequila has become a benchmark for excellence within the industry, inspiring others to strive for similar levels of quality and distinction.

Sydney, NSW

Who would have thought that when a young Will Edwards left his management consultant role with Deloitte in 2013 his distillery, Archie Rose, would become one of the most highly awarded distilleries in Australia. Distilling each botanical individually, using state-of-the-art column hybrid vacuum stills, the Archie Rose team is able to extract the fullest expression of flavours and aromas from each ingredient. Agricole Rum sits more aptly within the world of Cognac or Armagnac than it does a typical sugar cane distillate.

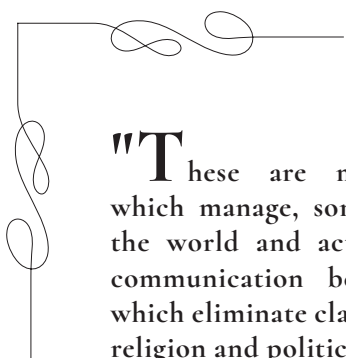
